AB 387 Thurmond	<p>Minimum Wage: Health Professionals Current law requires the minimum wage for all industries to not be less than specified amounts to be increased from January 1, 2017, to January 1, 2022, inclusive, for employers employing 26 or more employees and from January 1, 2018, to January 1, 2023, inclusive, for employers employing 25 or fewer employees, except when the scheduled increases are temporarily suspended by the Governor, based on certain determinations. The act requires the state board to approve a statewide greenhouse gas emissions limit equivalent to the statewide greenhouse gas emissions level in 1990 to be achieved by 2020 and to ensure that statewide greenhouse gas emissions are reduced to at least 40% below the 1990 level by 2030. AB 1964 Maienschein	<p>Organized Camps This bill would require organized day camps to either be accredited by the American Camp Association or have a written description of operating procedures that describes the program of organized and supervised activities of the organized day camp and meets other specified requirements. The bill would define an “organized day camp,” to be a program that provides group experiences for children under 18 years of age during the day, on days during school breaks, for a minimum of four hours per day on three or more consecutive days. The bill would exclude various programs and facilities from the definition of “organized day camp” for these purposes. The bill would require a local enforcement agency to issue an organized day camp a health and sanitation permit upon receipt of the written operating procedures or written verification that the camp is accredited by the American Camp Association, and, in the case of a tier 1 camp, as defined, verification that an initial inspection of the premises was conducted. AB 2221 Bloom	<p>Occupational Therapy The Occupational Therapy Practice Act provides for the licensure and regulation of the practice of occupational therapy by the California Board of Occupational Therapy. Current law defines the “practice of occupational therapy” and specifies that occupational therapy services encompass occupation therapy, assessment, treatment, education, and consultation with individuals referred for those services after diagnosis of a disease or disorder. Current law prohibits a person from practicing occupational therapy without being licensed under the act and makes a violation of that prohibition a crime. The measure would authorize the Legislature to exempt the sale of, or the storage, use, or other consumption in this state of, any food product from sales and use tax by a statute that becomes operative on or after November 7, 2018. SB 159 Allen	<p>Off-Highway Vehicles (SUBJECT WAS ARTS COUNCIL PREVIOUSLY – BILL WAS GUT & AMENDED) Current law generally imposes a service fee of \$7 for the issuance or renewal of identification of off-highway motor vehicles subject to identification, and a special fee of \$33 paid at the time of payment of the service fee. Existing law requires the special fees, specified use fees for state vehicular recreation areas, and other specified funds to be deposited in the Off-Highway Vehicle Trust Fund, and requires moneys in the fund, upon appropriation, to be allocated for specified purposes related to off-highway recreation. These provisions are to be repealed on January 1, 2018.
